# **EDUCATION + OUTREACH**

# 2,434

Back to Nature! was our mission in education, outreach, and public programs in 2021. We started the year with innovative virtual public programming including Bug Out with Bree and Explore the Coast with Hannah. These online trips encouraged and inspired **2,434** students to go outdoors and see what they could find in their backyard and beyond until we could reopen the Museum in April. Quickly elementary school students flocked to the Museum and Monarch Sanctuary to learn all about monarch butterflies, local natural history, and other native animals like steelhead trout and sand crabs. By the end of year, our in-person field trips hosted an additional **1,311** students at the Museum. Our doors are open - come visit the Museum with your class or family today!

In June we launched the highly anticipated return of summer camp and taught **over 100** children. Our incredible educators brought campers into worlds of wildlife, deep oceans, and the stars as they explored how incredible nature is. Our native plant garden's buckeye tree became a classroom, sheltering campers as they tested out their butterfly wings and designed their own museum exhibits. Campers enjoyed a long overdue exploration of new spaces and made new friends, a true gift to both families and the Museum staff who were able to help facilitate these priceless experiences.

Our goal upon reopening was to support our community in reconnecting with the outdoors and each other. Our LiMPETs field trips brought **623** middle and high school students to beaches and tidepools, often for the first time, to collect and add vital species data to a **19-year** dataset. As a Museum, we pride ourselves in creating hands-on outdoor experiences that immerse students in the wonders of the natural world. In 2021, our trips engaged and excited students, inspiring a new generation of naturalists, teachers, and scientists. We could not have asked for a better demonstration of how valuable these programs, including Watershed Guardians and Junior Naturalists, are to students around Monterey Bay and beyond.




# **EXHIBITS + COLLECTIONS**

Changes of Monterey, our newest exhibit focuses on the diverse ecosystems of Monterey County, how human activity affects them, and what visitors can do to be mindful of the way their choices impact the environment. We were also fortunate to host Shifting Tides: A Convergence in Cloth, a traveling exhibition organized by the Studio Art Quilt Association featuring a stunning array of textile pieces depicting the beauty of our oceans as well as the ecological threats they face. Our collections and exhibits represent the natural and cultural history of communities in Pacific Grove, the Monterey Bay, and beyond. This year we're designing and building our new 2022 exhibits and engaging our community of learners and science partners in brand new ways.




In partnership with CSUMB, the Museum hosted a digital year of our popular Illustrating Nature exhibit, featuring the works of graduating artists from the Science Illustration Program. Art from the 2021 show was hosted on our website with videos and photos of students creating their pieces. We also offered virtual classes for our members and the public in sketching and nature journaling taught by a local artist. We were thrilled with the innovative approaches in presenting this exhibit and the public loved the results. Special thanks to the Art Council for Monterey County for supporting this exhibit for over a decade.

The Museum's unique collection forms a meaningful connection to our community's history and acts as a repository for specimens that will be increasingly valuable to research in years to come. Caring for and effectively interpreting it is a core part of our mission. In 2021 we began the process of CAP (Conservation Assessment for Preservation) through the American Institute for Conservation to complete an assessment of our collection and facility to apply our resources as efficiently as possible toward our most pressing conservation needs. We also implemented an active environmental monitoring system through Conserv, allowing us to track and address preservation issues in real time. With these large initiatives, 2,247 objects were inventoried, 187 new records were added to the database, 110 objects were deaccessioned and 1,232 more catalog records were made available to the public on our online database.



# **COMMUNITY IMPACT + VOLUNTEERS**











Monarch butterflies returned to Pacific Grove in October, heralding a magical season. Our Monarch Docent program became the most popular program of the year, with 17 volunteers contributing **571** hours at the Monarch Sanctuary, which saw an incredible number of visitors. 2021 also saw a significant amount of monarch butterflies overwintering with **14,025** butterflies counted by our volunteers at the Monarch Sanctuary alone. In addition, the Museum is the Monterey County coordinator for the Xerces Western Monarch Count, which saw an unprecedented return of monarchs to the whole state: 250,000 throughout California, an extraordinary increase from less than 2,000 in 2020. Our phones were ringing off the hook with unique inquiries and we had 48 media hits on this topic alone.

Education is the heart of our Museum and community programs were back in action in 2021. Our family-friendly Science Saturdays thundered back with record breaking attendance, and the October Creepy Crawly event peaked at **664** excited visitors. Our California Naturalist program attracted and inspired adult learners who invested nights and weekends becoming certified California Naturalists led by our outstanding education staff. The after-hours Hardcore Natural History programs explored cutting-edge topics with regional experts including the value of good fire and habitat restoration. The Museum is also a proud participant in PG First Fridays each month from 6-9PM, come check out the Museum after hours!




At the beginning of 2021, our volunteers kept the Museum connected to the community by contributing to our Museum To You virtual programs. They also helped behind-the-scenes, constructing our new Changes of Monterey exhibit that opened in July. We know from experience that without volunteers, there could be no Museum! Our docents teach nature stewardship to visitors from around the world, assist with in-person field trips, and provide valuable data that brings about legislative environmental protections. With **1,961** volunteer hours in 2021, they guided our unique community science programs and we were thankful to get our Black Oystercatcher monitoring program and MPA Watch up and running again.
